



Tony has worked in a number of operational support roles within the NHS for over 30 years, he is currently accountable for the Health, Safety and Security systems within the Trust, as well as overseeing the incident, claims and central alert system functions. Part of his role is to work with clinical teams ensuring that the incident information, including all physical intervention activity is an accurate reflection of the Trust's activity and that it is used appropriately to support the planning of care and treatment for patients on their recovery journey, as well as corporate learning to improve the quality and safety of care locally and nationally.



Steve is the mental health lead for Northumbria Police with responsibility for street triage and including training and engagement activities with Northumberland, Tyne and Wear NHS Foundation Trust including Hopewood Park Medical Education Centre, Beckfield PICU.



Claire has been a registered Mental Health Nurse since March 2002. My clinical experience includes within Forensic Adult Services in various roles from Staff Nurse to Ward Manger; and more recently the Ward Manager on a Psychiatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU) From September 2014 I began an exciting and interesting new role in NTW, of the Clinical Police Liaison Lead, based within the trust safety team. The role was a new post created with the main aim to take a proactive approach, and establish improved working practices between the Police and NTW. This included engaging with both Northumbria Police and British Transport Police.



Roland started his career in mental health as Nursing Assistant in 1984, became an enrolled nurse in 1988 and a staff nurse in 1992. He was appointed unit manager and Clinical Nurse Specialist for the Greyfriars PICU in 1993. During 1996, with others, he formed NAPICU. Between 1993 and 2000 Roland spent time working as a matron manager and research consultant for Gloucestershire Health. He is the founding Editor-in-Chief for the Journal of Psychiatric Intensive Care. In 2000 he was appointed consultant nurse for Psychiatric Intensive Care and Secure recovery and became an Approved Clinician in 2012.



Bill is a leading specialist in the prevention and management of conflict. He is widely respected for his understanding of organisational conflict reduction strategies. He co-authored the Butterworth-Tolleys Managers Handbook on this subject and has played a key role in the development of National Occupational Standards. He is a guest lecturer at The University of South Wales on organisational change strategies in reducing violence and restrictive practices. Bill presented at the 2014 Violence in Healthcare World Conference in Miami on a national award winning initiative with a major UK hospital that has improved staff and patient safety. He was a critical reader of the BILD Code of Practice and on the NHS expert group that produced the 2014 'Meeting Needs: Reducing Distress' guidance.



Sandra is currently Head of the Patient and Carer Engagement Team and is very passionate and committed in ensuring the voices of people who come into contact with mental health services are heard. Sandra has worked in mental health for over 30 years and draws upon her own lived experience of recovery to empower others in their recovery journey, sharing strong values of compassion, promoting hope creating opportunities for others regardless of their life experiences.
