

"What the MOJ Really Says?"

The Mental Health Casework Section (MHCS) is part of the MoJ and acts on behalf of the Secretary of State for Justice, under delegated authority. MHCS has oversight of around 8000 restricted patients, who have been diverted away from the prison system and into the hospital system. Most of these patients progress through the secure hospital estate but some are admitted to PICUs, either following transfer from prison or recall from the community. Senior managers in MHCS will be giving a presentation on the Secretary of State's powers in relation to restricted patients, and what that means for PICUs.


